Currently, (left to right) <u>Dave Beeler</u>, <u>Brittney Powell</u>, and <u>Tom Konkle</u>, who have been co-creators on several successful ventures, have come together to write, act in, direct, and

produce a new film called *Trouble is My Business*. TIMB is a loving tribute to classic black and white noir stories. It follows the tale of a private investigator with a tarnished reputation. This PI, Roland Drake, is hired by a mysterious woman with a complicated and possibly violent past.

The project received some great attention during the development stage, and even Hollywood legend Lauren Bacall was among the cast, until her unfortunate death in 2014. The movie is now in post-production, but needs funds to be distributed in the best manner. Movie Stuff: Film and The Matter of Race

What I've Been Watching (and Thinking About)

I just wanted to begin with the Oscars, even though they are a bit of old news by now, so, let's get to it.

First, the elephant in the room, addressed by MC Chris Rock and others, was the issue of race, and possible discrimination by The Academy towards Hollywood talent of color. Was race truly an issue this year, were projects and people not chosen because of an insidious bigotry? I honestly don't know. I'm not much of an insider to really be in the know about how it all works. It could be true, or it could be a case of one person just not measuring up the same as their peers. I don't know.

Many in the industry are seen as left leaning liberals, and don't seem capable on the surface of such bigotry, but that's just a broad stereotype.

It was either that people were not judged by the color of their skin, but content of their character, (or demo reel), which is how it should be. OR, race was an issue, which is sad. Regardless, the fact that there was a *question*, means that we still have quite a ways to go to get this race stuff right. And I'd like to just touch on a few films that—in my opinion—offer a good understanding of racial and cultural differences.

To Kill a Mockingbird. This film is often used as vehicle to discuss race, and why not. A sweet and not always simple examination of life in rural-ish Alabama in the 1930s touches on single parent family dynamics, making new friends, and shattering more than one stereotype.

The Help. Like Mockingbird, this was based on a best selling book, and also follows the lives of blacks and whites in the South, this time the setting is 1960s Mississippi. The movie was released 2011, and starred some well-known folks like Allison Janney, Octavia Spencer, Emma Stone, Viola Davis and Jessica Chastain. I'd like to think that the star power would motivate more to see this film and continue the conversation about how ridiculous racism is.

The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel. Besides being a visually glorious movie, Hotel is a story about a huge cultural adjustment when several folks meet up at a "Retirement Hotel" in India. One of the best moments occurs before this group of aging British expats leave the UK. Maggie Smith's character Muriel is a feisty bigot who needs a hip replacement. And at one point she tells one of the hospital staff that she wants a "English doctor" after already refusing to be seen by a black doctor. So, along comes Dr. Ghujarapartidar, who is definitely English, and most definitely not what Muriel had in mind. The viewer loves seeing her put in her place more than once during the flick. And the viewer will also love [SPOILER] seeing Muriel grow and soften emotionally towards her new surroundings.

Rock the Kasbah. Alright, this movie did poorly at the box office and received mostly unfavorable reviews. One of the complaints is that Bill Murry didn't give it his all, or he seemed confused. While I'm not trying to defend the writing and direction of this story of a has-been rock manager Richie Lanz (Murray), my take is that Lanz's confusion stems from the bizarre circumstances of being stranded in Kabul, Afghanistan. This setting has the most fragile of political and religious constructs, and Lanz finds he cannot bluff and charm his way into or out of situations as blithely as he could in the States. However, he still manages to find a pure singing voice in a young Pashtun girl, and in turn convince several men to give her a chance to sing on Afghan Star (Like our American Idol). To witness Lanz's efforts to get his star heard is impressive, especially in a such patriarchal setting. The movie, if not great, is interesting and worth a look. What I'm Watching, Recording, or Deleting

So, what have I been keeping up with recently?



Girls. (Sundays 10:00pm ET, HBO) I love this show, even though all the main characters are quite whiney and self-absorbed. Oddly, the show reminds me of *Seinfeld*, the great comedy "about nothing." Jerry and pals were quite ego-centric as well, but we forgave them, 1) because they were so darn funny, and 2) because they all had redeeming qualities. Hannah and her friends share an incredible amount of angst, and many of their problems are self-induced. I could dope-slap Marnie for getting married when she knew she wasn't ready, Shoshanna for not thinking things through, Jessa for her occasional meanness, and Hannah for being Hannah, the most selfish of them all. Yet, like their 1990s

NYC counterparts, they too have redeeming qualities. They are all very bright and creative, and they are somehow endearing, as they ever-so-slowly mature.

The Family. (Sundays 9:00pm ET, ABC) I JUST started watching this recently, trying to catch up to the current episodes, but so far I'm only up to ep 3. The subject matter is depressing, how a family copes after losing a son, presumed dead, and the aftermath as he's found alive ten years later. The story telling is a bit dizzying, there are continual time-shifts between present day and the past, so far mostly ten years back, when young Adam Warren first disappeared. Despite the subject matter, the appeal is in the many mysteries and red herrings. The best casting bit is having Andrew McCarthy, who was a stalwart Brat Packer in the 80s, play Hank Asher, the Warren's possibly pedophilic neighbor. Asher had confessed



to Adam's murder and spent the subsequent time in prison. McCarthy so far is doing great in this role, evoking both empathy and rage.

The Talking Dead. (Sundays 10:00pm ET, AMC) Honest, I do watch some great shows that are NOT on Sunday night. But these are the first few shows that popped in my mind this time. Anyway, onward. So, as I may have mentioned before, I have not watched a ton of The Walking Dead, nor the much of the companion show here, hosted by Chris Hardwick. But TTD is a real treat. It is especially welcome as a comic relief after the often emotionally intense episodes of TWD. Basically, Hardwick hosts at least one actor from TWD, (sometimes it's someone who was just killed off in the previous hour), and usually someone on the creative end of the show, one of the writers, directors and/or producers. Also, TTD typically includes a celebrity fanboy/girl. Such guests have been Jason Alexander, Will Wheaton, Jim Gaffigan, or Zachary Levi. Even Marilyn Manson has graced the couch. The format of this hour long dissection is very fun. There's tons of discussion about plot points, (but never any spoilers), interactive Twitter games, funny and touching montages, and Hardwicks' rapid fire wit keeping everything together.

The Detour. (Mondays 9:00pm ET, TBS) This show is funny as...well it's just super funny. Created by *Full Frontal*'s Samantha Bee and her husband Jason Jones, *Detour* is a story of one totally messed up road trip, with kids. But it's got a different vibe than the classic *Vacation*, and each episode opens with a side plot in which husband Nate (Jones) explaining his precarious situation to a police detective, complete with white boards and photos of his family everywhere in an interrogation room, like a more fun version of *True Detective*. I'd recommend taking a trip with this family—but just through the TV.
